Mortenson kept his promise. He returned to the village the following year with a team of volunteers and began construction on the school. The project was not without its challenges. The Taliban, which was in control of the area at the time, was suspicious of Mortenson's intentions. They

Mortenson also spoke about the challenges of working in Pakistan.

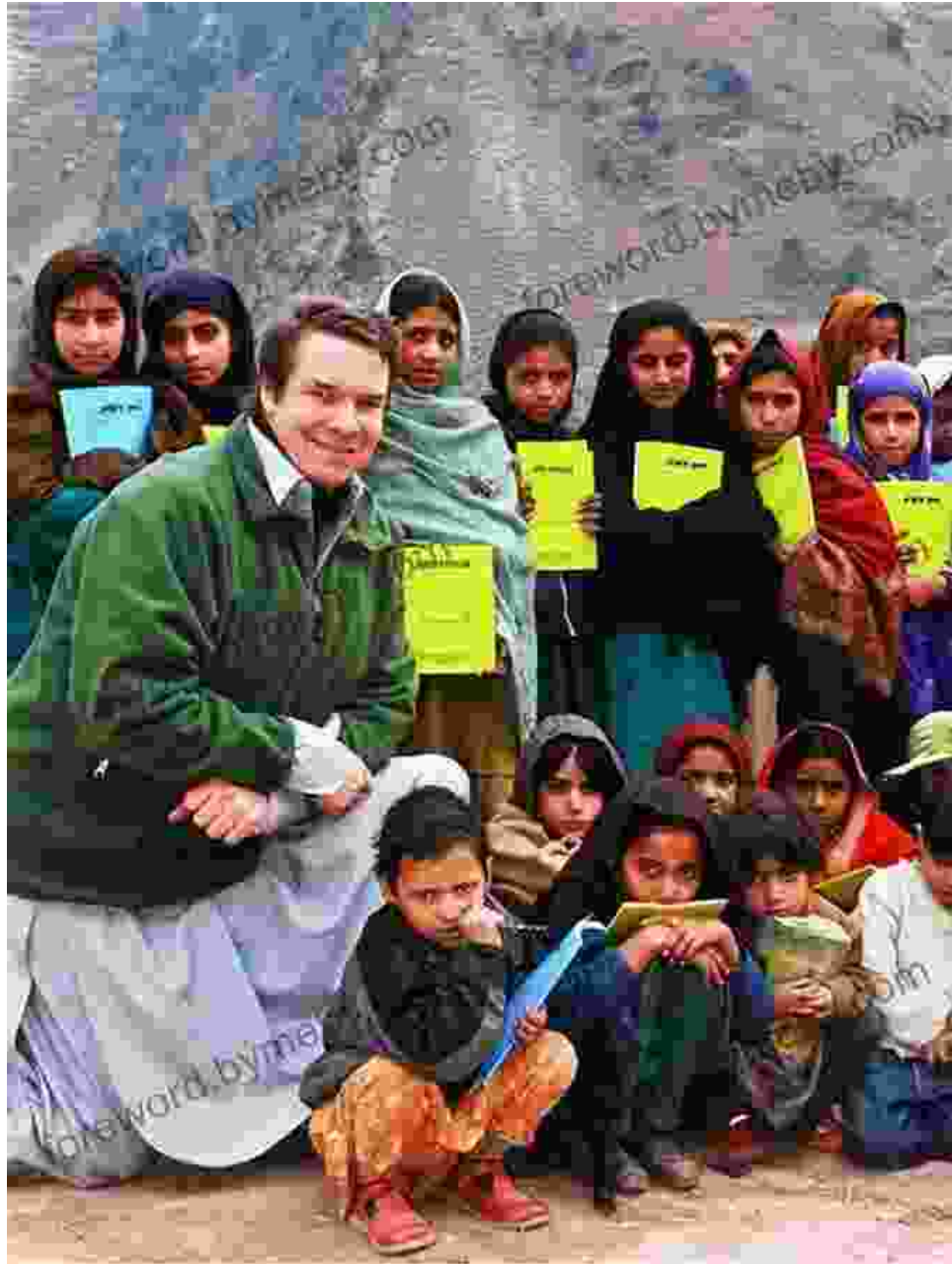

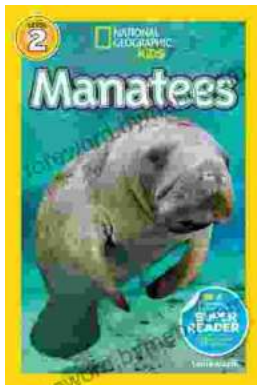
